






ADMISSIONS AND THE INDUCTION PROCESS



ADMISSIONS

Thank you for showing an interest in our school.

There are certain procedures which you need to follow when applying for a place at St. Helen's.

If you are applying for a place in next year's Reception Classes you should complete Southend Borough Council's Single Application Form (SAF) which must be submitted to them by **January 15th 2016.** The best way to apply is online at www.southend.gov.uk/admissions but if you require a paper application these can be obtained from the Civic Centre, Victoria Avenue, Southend.

Parents/Carers applying for a place at this Catholic School must also complete our Supplementary Information Form (SIF) – this is available from our school office or our website and if you are a practising Catholic, you should ask your Priest for a completed Certificate of Practice.

These forms (along with a copy of your child's Baptismal certificate) must be returned to our school office by <u>January</u> <u>22nd 2016</u> so that the Governors have the information in order to place the applications in priority order according to our admissions criteria.

YOU **MUST** COMPLETE BOTH SOUTHEND'S APPLICATION FORM AND THE SCHOOL'S SIF.

If you are applying for a place in any other school year (except Year 3's September intake) you DO NOT need to complete the Council's form.

Our catchment area (St. Helen's Parish) is identified on the last page of this prospectus.

The standard number to admit is 60 pupils. Each year, there is one intake in September and all children start school part-time. Parents/Carers will be informed of their child's allocated school place by the Borough Council on **18**th **April 2016**.

<u>Please note</u> the definition of a 'Practising Catholic' is a person who observes the Church's precept of attending Mass each Sunday and on Holy days of Obligation. The Governing Body will expect this practice to have been verified by a Catholic Priest using the Diocesan Certificate of Practice.



ST.HELEN'S SCHOOL'S ADMISSIONS CRITERIA:

- Looked after children from Catholic families and children who were looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted by Catholic families (or became subject to a residence order or special guardianship order).
- Baptised Catholic children of practising Catholic parent(s), whose practice is verified by a Catholic Priest and who live in the Parish of St. Helen's
- 3. Baptised Catholic children of practising Catholic parent (s), whose practice is verified by a Catholic Priest but who live outside the Parish of St. Helen's.
- 4. Other Baptised Catholic children, living within the Parish of St Helen's.
- 5. Other Baptised Catholic children, living outside of the Parish of St Helen's.
- 6. Catechumens and their children seeking Baptism and members of other Eastern Christian Churches.
- 7. Other Looked after children and children who were looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a residence order or special guardianship order).
- 8. Baptised Christian children of practising parent(s) as defined by their own Minister of Religion.
- 9. Christian children whose application is supported by a letter from their Minister.
- 10. Other children.

Visits

Any Parent/Carer who is considering applying for a place at St. Helen's is most welcome to visit the school and meet with the Head Teacher. Visits can be arranged by phoning the office for a mutually agreeable appointment.

Induction Sessions

Once a place at St. Helen's has been allocated to your child, we will contact you about our induction sessions (usually held in June/July and September). During these sessions, your child can spend some time getting used to their new exciting classroom and Parents/Carers are invited to a meeting, on the second session, with the Headteacher and other key people, such as the Parish Priest, Class Teacher and Chair of Governors.



Special Educational Needs

If your child has a statement of special needs, you will need to contact the Special Needs Department at the Civic Centre as the admissions system is different for statemented children. We are an inclusive school and your child and your family would be very welcome and we would do our very best to meet your child's needs.

Ofsted Inspectors (October 2011) stated that "The school works well with external agencies to support pupils who need additional help. There is good practice, evident in several cases, in supporting the health, social and behavioural needs of pupils facing challenging circumstances".

What you can do if your child does not get a place

If your child does not get allocated a place at St. Helen's, you have a right to appeal to an independent panel. Please contact the school if this is what you wish to do.

In addition to your right to appeal, you may wish to have your child's name placed on our waiting list. If a place becomes available, it will be allocated according to our admissions criteria.

Our Ethos



Our Ethos

St. Helen's is a Catholic School and as such every aspect of school life is based upon the Gospel values. Our Mission Statement centres around the word RESPECT and is a key tool in addressing all issues in our school – it is used regularly in assemblies, Masses (whole school and class Masses) and class Liturgies.

As a school, we set high standards both for work and behaviour. We also encourage our Pupils to develop their talents and to develop themselves spiritually, morally, socially and culturally. This is all in partnership with your family and the Parish family.

Assemblies are an important way to reinforce and develop our key values and beliefs. They are opportunities to gather as a prayerful community and they take many different forms so the children will have a rich experience of religious opportunities.

Our Prayer room is a space that is used by Pupils and staff alike in times of need, for prayer and reflection. The children are encouraged to add to prayers into our prayer book.



outside the prayer room – the children enjoy watching our school bus travel along our journey in R.E.

Every year we study 2 Religions other than Catholicity – this is essential in order that the children are prepared for the world they live in. These topics are often supplemented by trips such as to the Synagogue or by visitors from a specific faith coming into school to inform the children about their beliefs and customs.



The school Council play a key role in informing us about the views of the pupils in their class. The Pupils have to write a manifesto and get elected onto the Council by their class. The School Council set up our healthy tuckshop and came up with the idea of the 'fun factory' – an inside facility at lunchtime where children can do puzzles, drawing, etc. Over the past year, they have also collected pupil's views about the expansion to the school and what they think we need. Every year they also interview our nominees for the "Citizen of the Year".

We have many charity days throughout the year and the children often organise the competitions themselves and decide

which charity they would like to support.

Our Parish Priest regularly visits the school. He celebrates School and Class Masses, Reconciliation Services and other Liturgical Services. Some of these services take place in church.

Community Cohesion

Our last Ofsted Inspection report stated that "community cohesion is promoted well through the curriculum in relation to diverse faiths and lifestyles so that pupils develop secure

understanding of these".

St. Helen's – a healthy school



We are a "Healthy School". We strongly believe that children need to be encouraged to develop their healthy lifestyles at a young age which then they will hopefully continue throughout their lives.

Parents/Carers of our school also believe strongly in this initiative and support what we do.

So what do we do? Here are some of our activities:

- We run a successful school kitchen serving healthy school dinners which the children enjoy. All infant children (Years R, 1 and 2) are currently entitled to a free school dinner.
- We encourage pupils to have a balanced and healthy packed lunch.
- Our Healthy Cookery after school club is very popular.
- Cycling we encourage cycling to school and run an after school bike club. We also have a whole school curriculum unit on cycling.
- Wide range of after school sports clubs.
- Healthy snack policy Children may bring a plain biscuit or piece of fruit and a carton or small plastic bottle of non-fizzy drink for break time, but not sweets, chocolate or crisps. <u>Please note this is not required in</u> <u>Reception Year as the children make their own snacks in</u> <u>class. We currently ask for a contribution of towards the</u> <u>cost of ingredients (a letter will be sent to Parents/Carers</u> when their child starts Reception Year).
- Fruit & veg. Government initiative every child in the infant classes are given a piece of fruit or veg. to eat every day – this is very popular with the children.
- We also have our Healthy tuck-shop, "SNACK ATTACK" – from 20p – 50p, your child can choose a healthy snack for break-time.



• The children have two physical education lessons a week. These may be in the hall for dance or gymnastics or in the playground or on the field for games or athletics.

- We also run a programme called "Activate" whereby the children do 10 minutes of physical exercise first thing in the morning and a further 5 minutes at the beginning of the afternoon. This helps the children to focus more effectively on their work and also helps to develop their gross and fine motor skills.
- Swimming is an important part of our Physical Education Curriculum. Each class attends weekly lessons for one half term per year at Garon Park.
- Through our Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education programme, the children develop their skills in relation to safety, healthy living, positive relationships and being a responsible member of the local community.



- Our sports teams regularly compete against other schools and we send competitors to the Catholic Sports, Borough Sports and other inter schools competitions.
- We encourage all pupils to be as active as possible, irrespective of ability, because at this school SPORT IS FOR ALL again setting good patterns for the future.

Please note that we <u>do</u> have children in our school who are allergic to nuts and so St. Helen's is a 'nut-free' school.



Therefore we ask for your co-operation in ensuring that nut products are <u>not</u> brought into school.



PUNCTUALITY AND ATTENDANCE

IT IS A LEGAL REQUIREMENT THAT CHILDREN ATTEND SCHOOL REGULARLY AND ARRIVE ON TIME.

Our School Hours are:

Morning Session 08.45 a.m. – 12.25 p.m.

Afternoon Session 13.25 p.m. – 15.25 p.m.

Gates Open 08.35 a.m. & 15.15 p.m.



It is vital that the children are at school regularly and arrive on time so that they don't miss:

- vital learning experiences
- opportunities to mix socially within our community.

At the end of each term, pupils with 100% attendance are rewarded with a special wristband at assembly and if they achieve 100% for the whole year, they are presented with a gold badge and a gift voucher from the PTA.

If your child is ill, we ask you to contact the school office before 9.15 a.m. every day that your child will not be in school. We have an absence line which is available 24 hours a day where you can leave a message advising us of the reason for their absence. Please note the office itself is only open from **8.30am** til **4.30pm**.

Children who arrive at school after the gate closes at 8.45 a.m. have to be given a late mark. Children are encouraged to arrive on time and when they improve their punctuality, they are rewarded with stickers. If there is no change to their late pattern, the parent/carer will be invited in to speak with the Headteacher to discuss any difficulties there might be.

HOLIDAYS DURING TERM TIME

The Government have made it very clear that they think Parents/Carers should **not** take their children out of school during term time for holidays because of the negative impact it has on the child's education.

Head Teachers are no longer allowed to authorise holidays during term time. If, in extenuating circumstances, you need to take your child out of school, you need to write to the Head Teacher explaining the extenuating circumstances. The Head Teacher will then decide whether leave of absence can be granted for your child and, if so, for how long.

COMMUNICATION WITH PARENTS/CARERS

Each week Parents/Carers will receive a newsletter celebrating the successes of the week and informing them of any forthcoming events. We do ask you to read it each week. Where possible this is sent to Parents/Carers via email (and is also available on the web site).

You are welcome to discuss any concerns you have regarding your child, with the class teacher. However, we would ask you to make



an appointment through the school office if at all possible. You may wish to talk to the Headteacher and this can also be arranged by appointment.



Progress Meetings are arranged twice a year to enable teachers and Parents/Carers to discuss their child's progress. Children are also invited to these meetings to discuss their progress and hear what they need to focus on next.

A detailed written report on each child is sent out to Parents/Carers each summer and a mini report is discussed at the Autumn and Spring Parent/Carer meetings. There is an agreed policy of homework throughout the school and we do ask that you make sure that your child completes their homework.

All school policies can be viewed at the school office and some are available on the website. Should you require a copy there may be a small administration charge.

Texting Service

We have a texting and e-mailing service which we use to advise Parents and Carers of different events, changes to clubs, school closures (in the event of bad weather etc) and general information. You will be asked upon your child's enrolment whether or not you wish to sign up for this free service.

Child Protection

As a caring organisation with direct responsibility for children, our first concern must be with your child's welfare in all its aspects and therefore there may be occasions when we have to consult other agencies even before we contact you, particularly in relation to Child Protection concerns. The procedures we have to follow have been laid down by Southend, Essex and Thurrock Safeguarding Boards. All our staff receive training on these matters.

Charging Policy



Activities provided for children to enhance the basic curriculum may require donations from Parents/Carers to cover their cost.

No individual pupil will be excluded from participating on the basis that a contribution is not made. We do try to keep any donation requested from Parents/Carers to a minimum. Activities may have to be cancelled if there are insufficient donations made towards the cost.

Concerns/Complaints

St. Helen's ethos is central in all we do however we do realise there will be occasions when you may have concerns or may wish to make a complaint on curriculum or other matters. In the first instance please make an appointment with the class teacher. Should your concerns not be satisfactorily resolved, arrangements can be made for you to discuss the matter with the Headteacher. Should it be necessary, the next step would be to write to the Chairperson of Governors stating your concern/complaint.

We believe in two way communication and do take Parent/Carer concerns very seriously. In this way, we can all make sure your child is safe, happy and able to learn.



LIVING AND WORKING TOGETHER AS A COMMUNITY



From September 2015 we increased our Reception intake from 30 to 60 children.

At present, we are a small school and one of the benefits of being a small school is that, all the staff and children in our community know each other very well. This important commitment will continue as our school expands. We have systems in place where older children support the younger children – they take this responsibility very seriously. These systems include:

 GUARDIAN ANGELS, where year 6 pupils look after the Reception children when they first stay for lunchtime and support them on the playground until they feel confident and have made friends.

We also have Young Playleaders who organise lunchtime activities.

PROMOTING POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR

At St. Helen's, we expect high standards of behaviour which we link closely to the theme of Respect which is central to our Mission Statement.



Every member of our school community, both child and adult, deserve to be valued and shown respect and this is the core of our Promoting Positive Behaviour Policy.

Everyone is involved in promoting good behaviour – this includes staff, Parents, Carers and pupils. One way pupils have been involved is that they wrote our playground code – here it is:



We liaise closely with Parents/Carers in order to support their children in improving their behaviour – we find that if we all work together, there is usually a positive outcome.

We believe that in order for effective learning to take place, the children need to be well behaved so they and their peers can focus effectively on their tasks - be it individual, group or paired work.

As a school, we promote positive behaviour by awarding lots of well deserved certificates and giving lots of praise. Every week, a pupil is put forward to be the star of the week for their class and individual pupils or groups of pupils are awarded Headteacher awards – all these recognitions are celebrated in our weekly newsletter and through our celebration assembly.

By creating this atmosphere, the majority of our children do behave in an appropriate, polite and friendly manner which is often recognised and commented upon by visitors and when our children go out on trips. We support children who find controlling their behaviour a challenge but we also expect them to start being responsible for their behaviour – knowing they have made a choice and what the consequences of their actions will be.

If a child has misbehaved, they will sometimes be asked to miss their playtime in order to review their behaviour and then they will be offered a fresh start in line with Gospel values.

There may be occasions when a child's behaviour gives greater cause for concern. If a child's behaviour disrupts other children's learning or goes against our mantra that "everyone has a right to feel safe and happy on our playground", then an exclusion from school for a fixed period may be necessary. If the behaviour continues, a permanent exclusion may be considered. Every effort would be made to avoid this serious action.

ANTI - BULLYING



We aim to be a school where all children feel safe and happy both in school and on the playground. The school operates a policy of encouraging any child who experiences bullying **to tell**.

They may confide in any member of the school community or use our worry bag facility. This will then be


reported to a senior member of staff. Children are made aware that their concerns will be taken seriously, will be dealt with immediately and appropriate action/support will follow.



Every November, during National anti-bullying week, we revisit the theme of bullying when we revisit our slogan **NO BASH** – **No b**ullying **a**t **S**t. **H**elen's.

<u>PUPILS WHO SPEAK ENGLISH AS AN ADDITIONAL</u> LANGUAGE

Our school includes pupils for whom English is not their first language. We celebrate the many languages spoken in our school and support these pupils in becoming fluent in speaking English.



SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

Children with Special Educational Needs are fully included in our school community. They are given extra help individually and in small groups by their class teacher, a teaching assistant and our Inclusion Manager who is a teacher. Liaison between the Inclusion Manager and the class teachers ensures a consistent approach to addressing each child's needs.

We operate The Code of Practice to support children with special learning difficulties.

Materials and support are also available for children identified as gifted and talented.

PUPILS WITH DISABILITIES

Should a child with a disability join our school, all reasonable steps will be taken to ensure that they are given full access to the curriculum and made to feel a valued member of the school community.

In order to be better prepared for any disabled pupils or adults, we regularly review our provision and make plans to improve further. These 3 year plans are called our Accessibility Plan and our Disability Equality Scheme. Here are the current versions:

- To add a disability unit to our PSHCE programme.
- To continue to increase the number of books/ resources which include positive images of disabled people.
- To embed the use of mobile I.T. devices (Learnpads, laptops etc.) to support the learning of pupils with disabilities.
- To review progress and standards in Maths, Reading and Writing of any disabled pupils.
- For Subject Leaders to continue to consider the needs of disabled pupils who might join our school in the future and spend their budgets accordingly.

2. IMPROVEMENTS TO THE PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT

- To ensure that if the building project goes ahead, all the plans meet the Disability regulations and make the building easily accessible for disabled people.
- Pupils to be involved in discussions about making our new build accessible for disabled pupils.
- When redecorating any area, choose contrasting colours for any visually impaired pupils
- Edgings of playground and parts of adventure play- grounds to be painted yellow – for any visually impaired pupils.
- To continue to review our playground equipment and its accessibility for disabled children.

INFORMATION IN DIFFERENT FORMATS

- To continue to adapt resources to meet need e.g. enlarged print, pictorial clues, use of Makaton, use of simplified language.
- To continue to improve communication with Parent/Carers e.g. information on website, use of texting service etc.

- Analyse the needs of disabled pupils over break and lunchtimes and adapt staffing, where necessary, in order to support these pupils.
- Provide specialised equipment/ furniture for disabled staff and staff where possible.
- Make sure disabled people are comfortable at public school events – they are made welcome and where known, their needs are met.





HEALTH AND SAFETY ISSUES



JEWELLERY

A wrist watch and only one pair of <u>stud</u> earrings are permitted. Hoop earrings are not allowed for safety reasons. Earrings and watches need to be removed for P.E. lessons. Earrings should <u>be removed before school by Parents/Carers</u> for younger children or in school if older children can remove them independently. Staff are not allowed to remove pupils' earrings.

ILLNESS

Children who are ill should not be sent to school. However, there will be times when a child becomes ill at school. In these circumstances, we will contact the Parents/Carers so that the child can be collected from school. Therefore it is **essential** that we have up to date telephone contact numbers for you and your other nominated contacts.

If a child is injured and needs hospital treatment, we will make every effort to contact the Parents/Carers but if we are unable to make contact, your child will be taken to hospital by members of our staff – all members of our staff are trained in basic first aid and some have been trained in paediatric first aid and first aid at work.

MEDICATION

Children using asthma pumps will be supervised – please make sure that all pumps are named, handed to the school office and that they are regularly checked to make sure they are not empty/out of date.

It is not currently the practice of this school to give medicines to children, unless the child has a chronic condition which requires regular medication. If your child is on medication, such as completing a course of anti-biotics, Parents/Carers can come into school to give their child the medication at an appropriate time.

PARKING

With the children's safety in mind we ask Parents/Carers to park safely and responsibly. There is a public car park near to the junction of North Road and London Road which is currently free before 9am although there is a small charge if you need to use it at any other time.


