## Hedgehogs And Squirrels

Finding the total! A game for two.

Using the numbered cards in a pack of cards, deal 10 cards to each player. Both players lay their top card on the table. The first to call out the total of the two quantities wins the two cards and lays them to one side. The person who collects the most cards at the end of the game is the winner. A good tip to help you is to count the total number of symbols on both cards to find the answer. You will get quicker the more times you play.

## Hopscotch fun!

Using chalk mark out a hopscotch grid, with numbers to 12. Throw a beanbag or small cuddly toy into one of the squares. When hopping and skipping on the grid, jump over the number the toy has landed on, then pick it up. Remember to call out the numbers on your way to the top and then back again.

Delicious jam tarts for your imaginary tea shop You need:

3 cups of plain flour

1 cup of unsalted butter

1 cup of caster sugar

1 large egg

Jam

Cut the butter into small pieces and add to the flour and sugar. Rub together will your hands until it look like breadcrumbs. Crack the egg into the bowl and mix together. Form into a dough ball and wrap in cling film. Pop it into the fridge for 15 minutes. Flour your surface, then roll out the dough. Use a round cutter and cut out tart cases, place each in a greased muffin tray. Using a spoon, add jam. Ask your adult to pop the jam tarts in the oven for 10 minutes at 180 /350. Your adult can place them on a wire rack to cool.

Serve your jam tarts in your tea shop. Make a shop sign and a menu. Write down the orders. Total the price and exchange money. Use a spatula to place your jam tarts on plates. Then serve your customers. Have fun.
